






Reconciliation Walk May 31, 2015 Prior to release of TRC Report





REMEMBERING AND HONOURING RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL CHILDREN

BEGINNING IN THE 1870s, 150,000 Indigenous children were placed in government—sponsored residential schools, many suffering physical and sexual abuse. More than six thousand children died. The last residential school closed in 1996. This forest is dedicated to reconciliation and healing.


