


- ★ The UN Food and Agricultural Organization has made a powerful plea to return to regenerative farming, farming based on agroforestry

"Regenerative Farming" an African-Indigenous System



- system developed over millennia
- revived in US by a Black farmer Dr. George Washington Carver, of Tuskegee University in the early 1900s. -
- Carver codified the use of crop rotation with the planting of nitrogen-fixing legumes & detailed how to regenerate soil biology.
- His system was known as Regenerative Agriculture

Polyculture vs Monoculture







- ★ The Hausa farmers of Nigeria developed more than 156 systematic crop combinations, including no-till polycultures
- ★ Other global indigenous cultures used these techniques






Why Agroforestry; No Till / Lasagna Gardening

Food Forest Benefits

Food security. nutrition, cash income, restoring soil fertility, protecting watersheds, food and habitat to many pollinator species. Absorbing carbon dioxide, provides shade and humidity.

City parks, schools, universities churches, long term care facilities, low income housing and community centers became free organic food forest sites within a half mile radius of residents. Providing access to approx 8000 people.



7000sq Transformed in 4yrs

Crosses barriers, social economic, culture, age, gender, class etc., creating community and connection through food. A place of relaxation, education, medicinal herbs. wildlife habitat, pollinator hedges and permaculture teachings


Billion

Acres of globally abandoned land x 50 tons carbon = 209.6 gigatons of carbon stored in forest growth within 10 years



Increase Public confidence that the free public food is safe to eat and not contaminated by pesticides, etc. Increase public knowledge what is edible. Ensure each site has stewards to tend and manage the food forests.





























